The Mother and Infant Home Visiting Program Evaluation-Strong Start's (MIHOPE-Strong Start) Second Annual Report from the Office of Planning, Research & Evaluation: "This report details MIHOPE-Strong Start's process of acquiring administrative vital records and Medicaid data from 20 states and more than 40 state agencies. The study relies on administrative data to measure infant and maternal health, health care use, and cost outcomes. Policymakers have increasingly encouraged greater access to and use of administrative data to produce timely, rigorous, and lower-cost evaluations of health and social programs, since these records may be less costly and more accurate than information collected directly from families."

“More than 60,000 DC residents are essentially locked out of the City’s economy because they lack a high school diploma or its equivalent, and need to significantly increase their education, skills, and credentials in order to progress to the goal of a family-supporting job.”

One of the proposed strategies is to “create a single, integrated database on workforce program customers for all workforce/adult education programs. The database would include information on client assessment, referrals, program usage, and transitions among individual programs. (Example: Chicago’s Integrated Workforce Information System.) OSSE and DOES are currently developing a “Data Vault” that bridges data systems used by various District agencies and has interface capability with the Statewide Longitudinal Education Data System (SLED—an educational data repository operated by OSSE) that could achieve this vision if implemented well.” Please click [here](#) for the link to the article.

At the national level, this disconnect recently led to proposed legislation in Congress to broaden the definition used by the homeless system to align with that used by the schools, the latter of which includes living “doubled-up” with other households.”

[WA State utilizes IDS to Evaluate the Transition to “Managed Medical Care for Clients with Disabilities and Behavioral Health Needs”](#)

“This policy brief reviews the experience of Medicaid enrollees with disabilities during the first year of medical managed care implementation. We compare the experience of disabled persons with mental illness and/or substance use disorders, relative to the experience of disabled persons who do not have identified behavioral health disorders.”

“These findings have implications for the development of performance-based contracts required under Engrossed House Bill (EHB) 1519 (Chapter 320, Laws of 2013). EHB 1519 requires that state agency contracts with Area Agencies on Aging, Regional Support Networks, county agencies, and managed care organizations include performance measures to address a wide range of outcomes, including many outcome areas examined in this report. As the state moves towards performance-based contracting for services, it is important for policy makers to recognize that client outcomes

reflect the combined impact of the care the client receives, the client's risk attributes and other factors." Please click [here](#) to read the full article.
